These include: STEM Building Project—our Science, Technology, Engineering and Math's grant is allowing us to have students learning in a modern 21st century collaborative spaces. Stage 1 (blue unit) will be completed 15/11/17 for handover with new paint, glazing, joinery and I.T facilities. Stage 2 (red unit) and a new outdoor learning area will fol-

low. At a site meeting this week all works is projected to be completed 29/1/18.

Our School Numbers are Growing a sub committee of Governing Council is meeting regularly to gain the best facilities and resources for our students they are in contact with the Education Department to keep this on the schools agenda.

Fund My Neighbourhood KPS have been successful in having 2 projects available for voting in this Government initiative. With your Newsletter is a brochure giving all details by voting and spreading the word to vote for Kilkenny. We with

your vote will be able to fund 2 important initiatives for our school.

Curriculum News

Over the last 2 weeks and including our pupil free day, staff were led through 3 Professional Development sessions around our student achievement data. We used both our NAPLAN and our PAT (Progressive Achievement Testing) data to begin our self-review process for 2017, with an eye to site improvement planning in 2018.

For this process, we chose to focus our data review on numeracy, as this has also been a priority for our site and the Inner West Partnership for 2017. Over

the last year we have had staff involved in a number of Numeracy focused projects, based on improving numeracy outcomes for our learners.

Staff were involved in reviewing a range of different data sets and they recorded their observations, questions or comments in relation to what they were seeing in the data.

Our focus questions were based around trends and patterns emerging in our data over time. Year level and cohort tracking across

year levels. Comparisons between KPS and like schools as well as a look at how we compare nationally and within the Inner West Partnership.

More information about this data will be provided through our 2017 school annual report, however in summary our overall data analysis demonstrated our students are demonstrating growth in targeted areas of focus as well as highlighting areas for future improvement in 2018.

PRESCHOOL — Louise Cutri / James Golin




During Week 10 of Term 3 and Week 2 of Term 4, the preschool children went on an excursion to Lartelare Park next to Port River. This excursion was organised to extend on children's understanding about Aboriginal culture. Lartelare is a significant site for the Kurna people and was the birthplace in 1851 for Lartelare Rebecca Spender.

The children had a wonderful day exploring the significant sites, playing games, listening to music, eating, drawing pictures, walking around the Marina and Mrs Cutri's group saw a dolphin. The excursion allowed children to resource their own learning through connecting with people, place, technologies and natural and processed materials. They also transferred and adapted what they have learned from one context to another: saying the 'Ninna Marni Welcome', knowledge of animal names in Kurna, use of symbols and pictures to tell a story. We are proud that the children can respond to diversity with respect. We know that they care for and are socially responsible and show respect for the environment.



RED 1 — Year 3— Steph Johnson

In STEM this term, we are focusing on famous structures around the world. So far we have chosen a famous structure, started making it out of recycled materials and have begun an inquiry into our structures. Later in the term, we will be designing our own original structure for a special purpose linked to our learning around 'celebrations'.



RED 2 — Year 2— Lana Krueger

This term Red 2 are investigating Mapping and Location. We are learning about co-ordinates and how we use them to locate items on a map. We are learning about the points on a compass and finding directions.

We have enjoyed our first session in the kitchen with Kate, practising our cutting, rolling, mixing, stirring and measuring skills.

We have had a lot of fun and learnt some very useful tips to improve our batting and bowling during two cricket clinics.



RED 3 — Year 1-2—Jaimee Charter

Students have been following their animal instincts over the last few weeks. We have been learning to research individually, in small and large groups. This has helped us worked with a range of different peers and develop our collaboration, communication and curiosity. In conjunction with a book week book, we got very interested in endangered animals. Children chose an Endangered animal



“I helped plant some tomatoes. I got dirty digging the hole” - Jackson


“I spread the straw around the plants to keep the ground wet” - Ayan

The award is just reward for his dedication to his education, as well as his ambition to produce the highest quality work.




BLUE 1 — Year 4/5—Michael Kennett
