Curriculum News —

"Even the people whom society thinks of as geniuses actually worked really hard and in exceptional ways to achieve their accomplishments" Jo Bolar Stanford Professor of Mathematics Education, Online Course Experimenter, Co-Founder of Youcubed, author of the new book: Mathematical Mindsets. I found the above quote from Jo Bolar on her YouCubed website www.youcubed.org. It is stating that even the most talented of people had to work hard to achieve their goals. They did not rely on the idea that they were gifted – more on the idea of hard work. If you asked Ein-

stein I wonder if he would think he was gifted? He would probably be insulted at the notion and argue that hard work, commitment, resilience, teamwork, passion, curiosity were more important traits to display and rely upon to achieve his success than the false notion of giftedness.

Professor Bolar believes that to allow all students a chance to enjoy and learn math, the idea of giftedness within classrooms must be put aside and instead an idea adopted that sees educators promoting that everyone can learn math to the same level, no matter whether they have a so called Math Brain

or not. At KPS, several staff have undertaken the Stanford University 'How to Teach Math' course for Educators. In our Inner West Partnership, the drive is to promote critical and creative thinking at the core of all Numeracy pedagogy and embed critical and creative thinking into all classrooms. The Champion Clicker

Who is the fastest finger clicker in the class? Are you slower with one hand than the other? How much faster could you click if you practiced for a week? Use a stopwatch or a clock with a second hand and stop at 30 seconds and record your results.

What can you find out?

Find out about each number from 1 to 20. Is the number even or odd? Does it make a square pattern? Does it make more than one rectangle? Using unifix cubes- record your results

BLUE 1 — Michael Kennett

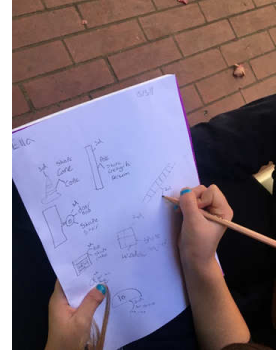
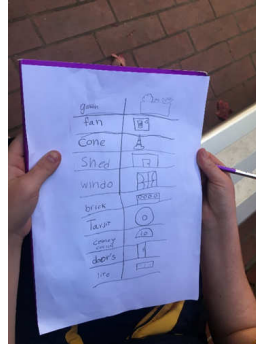

I will also have coffee available till 3.30pm on Tuesdays, to help get through staff meeting .—You will need to pay cash or QKR but need to show receipt upon ordering



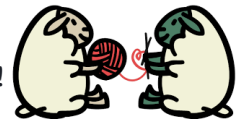
GARDEN — Tony Bryant

Some Mail From Hayley

Just for a moment I want you to imagine with me that you are with a friend, or at work, or in the playground, or somewhere else with a few people. In that place the conversation turns towards you... and you hear, 'oh you could have done that better', 'you are so bad at that', 'it is really annoying when you..', 'you frustrated me at..'. Then just stop and imagine some of the emotions that would be running through your body- are they hard to have ones like me?

At a recent training session, I was reminded how quick our brains are to notice and think the above phrases, and sometimes even say them to others. Yet if I were the person on the receiving end, it would make me feel crushed, hopeless, quite upset and it definitely would not be an encouraging place to try new things.

Yet in this session I was encouraged to '**catch the good in others**'. She said, '**we are like gold miners sifting for gold**'. This idea has really challenged my mindset this term. As like gold mining, to notice the good in others, takes a bit of time and deliberate looking to begin with (as our brains don't naturally go there). I have been challenged to notice (no matter how small or fleeting) things like; '*I appreciated when..*', '*you were helpful at..*', '*I saw change in..*', '*you were kind to..*', '*I liked when..*', '*I noticed you helped...*'.

Remember that sifting for gold, often involves finding the small flecks of gold in a lot of dirt (not just the large golden nuggets). But what if we were **gold miners here at KPS, who knows what harvest we might produce?!**

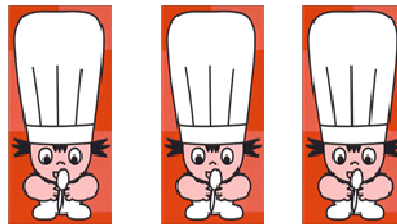
